In August 1998, when the 30 members of the Clan Society of Scotland were here, we had Lady Elizabeth Fairbairn install Cathy as an Honorary Member of the Clan Mackay Association of Canada.

Cathy will be remembered for her charm, good humour, her knowledge of Clan Mackay history, her dedication to our Clan and her love for her family.

She leaves her daughter, Sheila Ross of Flesherton ON.

Cathy's brother Ian Mackay of Ross on Wye, a former member of our Clan, passed away in 2005
