Canadian Mackays join in Bi-Centenary Celebrations in Scotland

In July 2006, the Clan Mackay Society of Scotland celebrated the bi-centenary of its founding in Glasgow in 1806. A week of festivities was planned by the Society to mark this auspicious occasion, and 12 Canadian Mackays were fortunate enough to attend the celebrations. The President of the Clan Mackay Association of Canada, Mora Mackay Cairns and her husband Bob, were joined by Gordon, Catherine and Heather Mackay, and by Charles and Jennifer Mackay and their children Hugh, Joe, Sam and Cecily, and friend Deborah Watten from New Brunswick. Several members of the Clan Mackay Society of the United States, including President David Mackay and his wife Cheryl also attended.

True to the precedent set by the Scottish Society, the festivities, organized largely by Society executive member Shiona Mackay, assisted by her husband David, and D. Colin Mackay, a Vice-President of the Society, were wonderfully planned, extremely enjoyable and a great success.

Many of the Mackays who traveled "across the pond" to attend, stayed at the Pollock Halls Residences at the University of Edinburgh. The location proved not only to be conveniently located, but was comfortable and had excellent tourist information, and great dining facilities. It was also beautifully landscaped, and it was a pleasure to walk among its well-maintained gardens each day.

The Mackay celebrations officially began on Thursday July 20, 2006 with a Civic Reception at the City Chambers on Edinburgh's Royal Mile. The Mackays, many adorned in kilts, trewes and tartan, were warmly welcomed to Edinburgh and congratulated on their bi-centenary by Edinburgh City officials. The evening provided a wonderful opportunity to reacquaint ourselves with our Scottish friends, and to meet members of the Society we had not met previously.

On Friday evening, the Grand Bi-Centenary Dinner, the focal event of the festivities was held at the Mungo Museum, Glasgow, where the Clan Mackay Society had been founded in 1806. It was a fine affair, with the presence of the Chief of the Clan Mackay, the Right Honourable Hugh William Mackay, Lord Reay, and his sister, the President of the Clan Mackay Society, and a great friend of the Canadian Mackays. The Honourable Elizabeth Fairburn MBE gave the opening address.

A welcome to Glasgow was given by Mr. Murray Blair, who spoke about Glasgow as it was when the Clan Mackay Society was founded in 1806. Grace was said by Mora Mackay Cairns, President of our Association, which was followed by a lovely three course meal. After dinner, David Mackay, President of the Clan Mackay Society of the United States, toasted the Clan Mackay Society of Scotland. An extremely interesting, and well researched reply was given by Lord Reay. Both the Clan Mackay Society of the United States, and our Association were presented with beautiful paintings by Bill Mackay, a Vice-President of the Society, and the Society's *Grabhalair* (sculptor).

The marvelous evening concluded with entertainment by a piper and singer, and a vote of thanks by D. Colin Mackay. A special thank you must be given to Ian (Secretary of the Society) and his wife Esme Mackay of Glasgow, long-time members of the Society, and good friends, who played a large role in organizing the dinner and creating the lovely gifts we were given to take home.

Of course, no Scottish occasion would be complete without a ceilidh, and a grand one was held on Saturday evening at the Netherbow Centre, on the Royal Mile in Edinburgh. As noted on its website, the Centre was named after Edinburgh's principal gateway, the Netherbow Port, whose bell is mounted in the centre's outdoor courtyard, and is the cultural hub of Edinburgh's Royal Mile, in the heart of the Old Town. The Netherbow's facilities include the John Knox House Museum, a theatre, cafe and gallery, and the recently opened Scottish Storytelling Centre. We were treated to a wonderful evening of Scottish music, dance and story-telling. We had the pleasure of listening to the choir of tour organizer Shiona Mackay and her husband David, and were greatly entertained by the story-telling of D. Colin Mackay.

Another essential element of any Scottish trip is, of course, whiskey! We all had a chance to experience that on our tour of a whiskey distillery in East Lothian. During the tour, we learned about all the stages of distilling whiskey, from "barley to bottle", and did not let the fact that it was Sunday stop us from enjoying a tipple afterwards!

The final event of the festivities, was an historical tour of Linlithgow and Falkland Palaces on Monday. Linlithgow is one of Scotland's oldest towns, and its main attraction is the magnificent ruin of the Linlithgow Palace, built in the 15th century. The Palace was a favourite Royal residence of James V, and the birth place of his daughter, Mary Queen of Scots. The King's Fountain in the courtyard, is the oldest fountain in Britain, and is said to have flowed with wine during a visit by Bonnie Prince Charlie in 1745. Although it was restored to full working order in 2005, no wine flowed from it on the day of our visit!

Falkland Palace is a splendid renaissance palace completed by the builders of James V in 1539 and was once a country residence of the Stewart monarchs. The Palace's Chapel dates from the mid-16th century, and much of its decoration, including painted ceiling, was done for a visit of Charles I in 1633. The Chapel still houses wonderful 17th century Flemish tapestries.

During our trip to Linlithgow, we also enjoyed the hospitality of John Mackay, Treasurer of the Society, and his wife Sandra, who opened their home in to us, and served tea and goodies in their beautiful garden. Our long-time friend Bill Mackay attended in his kilt and obligingly posed for endless photos!

[My trip also included some site-seeing in Edinburgh. One highlight was a walk along the base of Arthur's seat from Pollock Halls to the new Scottish Parliament building, located at the foot of the Royal Mile by Holyroodhouse Palace. The site is a symbolic one, as this location has been a seat of Scottish power, religious and royal, for over a thousand years. The building houses the Scottish Parliament, which was convened in 1999, the first Scottish Parliament since the Act of Union between Scotland and England in 1707. The Parliament handles "devolved matters", which are quite similar to those handled by our provincial legislatures: health, education, housing and transport. The

British Parliament at Westminster retains power over matters similar to those of our federal government.

The Parliament building was officially opened by the Queen in 2004. The design of the building, which is certainly not traditional Scottish architecture, has been criticized by some Scots, as is the fact that the building took much longer than expected to completed and was 10 times over budget. However, I would challenge any Scot not get a lump in the throat while watching a video of the building's grand opening, which is shown at the conclusion of a tour of the building.

Another high spot of my visit was a tour the Royal Yacht Britannia, which has been decommissioned and is now docked at the Ocean Terminal, Leith, Edinburgh. Touring the yacht gives a glimpse into Royal life, as well as an excellent history of the yacht's tours around the world. Many of the souvenirs given to the Royal Family during their travels remain on board. It is hard to believe that the yacht is now a banquet facility which can be rented for special occasions.

Perhaps most interesting, was a visit to Rosslyn Chapel, which has always been a tourist destination, but has now gained celebrity status due to its role in *The Da Vinci Code*, which has allowed the Chapel to gather the funds necessary to do extensive renovations on this 15th century chapel. The interior of the Chapel has been described as a "monument to masons" due to its ornately carved interior, which is rich in symbolic imagery. The Chapel has been associated with Freemasonry and the Knights Templar, and some even say that the Holy Grail is housed in the hidden vaults beneath it! How fortunate we were to attend the Chapel as guests of long-time Clan Mackay Society member, and dear friend, Marion Mackay Wellwood.]

Of course the absolute highlight of the trip was the chance to visit with many old friends from the Clan Mackay Society; some of whom we met on our first Clan Mackay trip to Scotland in 1989, and whose warmth and hospitality never ceases to amaze us!

We had a wonderful visit with Marion Mackay Wellwood and Marie Mackay, wife of the late Charlie Mackay, both long-time members of the Society, and dear friends to the Canadian Mackays, at Marion's home. This visit has taken on new poignancy with the recent death of Marie (February 24, 2007). How lucky we are to have the opportunity to see her once again! World-traveler Fiona Mackay Smith, and her mother, Magda Mackay Smith (now 90!), also opened their home to the Canadian and American Mackays, by hosting a dinner in our honour. And of course, no Clan gathering would be complete without Norman and Moira! It was a wonderful opportunity to catch-up with friends new and old. Our trip was also a time to remember dear departed friends such as Charlie Mackay and Jim Wellwood, who were sorely missed, but whose presence remains.

This memorable week has made us eager to return to Scotland! Until we meet again!
